## **FUNDING LATEST**

There is only more opportunity to apply for funding through the **Community Covenant Grant Scheme**.

The scheme provides grants of £100 to £250,000 for local projects which strengthen the ties or the mutual understanding between members of the Armed Forces Community and the wider community in which they live.

Applications need to be made through the Partnership to ensure that the project meets the grant criteria and local requirement before they can be submitted to a regional panel for consideration.

The final deadline for applications to be submitted to the Partnership is Friday 19 December 2014.

### WORCESTER ARTILLERY DAY

Thousands of people turned out to support the troops at an event marking the 150th anniversary of the city's local Army Reserve unit, 214 (Worcestershire) Battery Royal Artillery, and the centenary of World War One.

Tanks, rocket launchers, a re-enactment of War Horse-style First World War battles and a parachute display by the RAF Falcons were just some of the attractions on display at Worcester's Artillery Day on Saturday, August 16.





The day started at 9.30am with a service of remembrance at Worcester Cathedral and was followed at midday

by members of 214 Battery who paraded through the city centre, with artillery guns past and present and the famous Royal Artillery Band.

A salute was taken outside the Guildhall by the Lord Lieutenant of Worcestershire, Lt Col Patrick Holcroft LVO OBE; the Mayor of Worcester, Councillor Alan Amos; and Major General JR Free CBE of the Royal Artillery before the parade made its way to Pitchcroft racecourse.





At Pitchcroft, an opening salute of regimental light guns from WW1 and WW2 set things off with a bang as thousands of visitors enjoyed an afternoon of military activities, music, displays and exhibitions.



Army vehicles throughout the ages were on show as well as many charities ready to tell people about their experiences in war, battle, training, and how it all was during WWI and the differences with armed forces today.

Visitors also got to try a bit of target practice on a laser clay pigeon shoot and face the challenge of an army climbing tower with younger visitors having the opportunity to drive miniature tanks.

The Army Reserve unit, today's 214 Battery was originally formed in 1864 as the Worcestershire Volunteer Artillery Corps. The regiment fought in France and Italy during the First World War and in North Africa during World War Two. In more recent years, soldiers from 214 Battery have seen action in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Worcester Artillery Day was supported by Worcester City Council, the Worcester Festival and the Worcestershire World War One Hundred campaign with additional funding provided through the Worcestershire County Councillor Divisional Fund and the Armed Forces Community Covenant Grant Scheme.

### VICTORIA CROSS PAVING STONE UNVEILED TO COMMEMORATE LOCAL HERO

Worcester people have held a special ceremony to remember one of the city's bravest sons. The event, organised by Worcester City Council, saw the unveiling of a commemorative paving stone to honour George Wyatt, a soldier who valiantly contributed to the First World War effort on the front line.



The unveiling of the Commemorative Paving Stone is part of a national programme, co-ordinated by the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG.) The programme invites local authorities to participate in commemorating those who were awarded the Victoria Cross during World War One. Worcester is among the first ten cities nationally to commemorate this event which was attended by representatives from the Royal British Legion and the Coldstream Guards.



George Henry Wyatt went above and beyond his duty as a soldier in the war and was awarded the Victoria Cross for his bravery in the face of the enemy. To commemorate this prestigious award, Councillor David Wilkinson, City Council cabinet member for safer and stronger communities unveiled the stone at a ceremony outside the Guildhall on 26 August.

Wyatt was born on September 5, 1896, in Britannia Row, Worcester. At the outbreak of the First World War, he left for France on 14 August 1914 as a member of the British Expeditionary Force. During the War, Wyatt risked his life by saving his Battalion from burning farm buildings which were set alight by the Germans during heavy fire. Wyatt then demonstrated his extraordinary courage again, through his continued support of his comrades on the front line despite suffering serious head wounds. Upon receiving the Victoria Cross, Wyatt modestly said, "I just did as I was told." After the war, George Wyatt served with Doncaster Police until his retirement in 1934.

Councillor David Wilkinson said: "I am proud that Worcester has been able to commemorate the courageous actions of a soldier born in Britannia Road. The Victoria Cross is the most prestigious military award and this is an appropriate and important way of marking the bravery of our very own World War One hero."

Frederick Dancox, who served in the ranks of the fourth Battalion Worcestershire regiment, was also awarded the Victoria Cross in 1917 for his courage and dedication to the war effort. The commemoration of a second paving stone to mark Dancox's achievements will take place in 2017.

## WORCESTERSHIRE AT WAR EXHIBITION

An exhibition to mark the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War opened at the beginning of August at The Hive, Sawmill Walk, The Butts, Worcester.

The displays include photographs and documents from Worcestershire Archive and Archaeology Service, including scenes at Home and at the Front.

The exhibition has three main themes about Worcestershire and the war:

- gender and home front
- childhood
- cities at war

The exhibition is part-funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Voices of War and Peace, First World War Engagement centre and runs until the end of October and is free to visit.

## **CENTENARY CHORUS**

Sing UK is managing a project culminating in a concert in the Royal Albert Hall on Sunday 28 September at 3.00pm.

Their specially-formed 'Centenary Chorus' is made up of 600 young singers from England, France, Germany and Belgium. Of the 600, 300 are from Worcestershire and that's because of the work Sing UK has been doing in the county for the last five years during which time they've created exceptional singing opportunities for hundreds of teenagers from 14 of the county's state secondary schools (10 of those are taking part in their First World War project). These young people will be coming together in a spirit of peace and reconciliation to perform Karl Jenkins's The Armed Man - a Mass for Peace with the Philharmonia Orchestra, and to make their own contribution to the centenary commemorations taking place.

Worcestershire is playing an important part in this national and international event and it really is going to be a quite extraordinary and unique concert.

A special feature of the concert is the screening of photo-journalist Mike St. Maur Sheil's 'Fields of Battle - Lands of Peace' exhibition (currently in St. James's Park, London) during the performance of The Armed Man. Mike's images are stunning: he has spent the last eight years photographing the battlefields of the First World War - all over the world: <u>www.fieldsofbattle1418.org</u>. His images show how, over the last 100 years, nature has helped to heal the battlefield landscapes. There is a natural synergy between Mike's work and what Sing UK are setting out to achieve in terms of international collaborative working and demonstrating how the universal language of music brings people and countries, who were once at war, together.

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### UPDATE ON ARMY BASING PLAN

In July 2012 the outcome of the Army 2020 Study was announced. It said the Army would be made up of an integrated force of 112,000 personnel; 82,000 Regular soldiers and 30,000 trained Reserve soldiers.



The Army 2020 structure will be made up of a Reaction Force capable of undertaking short notice operational tasks, and an Adaptable Force used for a wide range of tasks including providing HQs and units for ongoing operations, Defence Engagement and homeland resilience. Support to both these forces would be provided by Force Troops with a wide range of capabilities such as artillery, logistics, military intelligence and signals.

18 months ago the Defence Secretary Philip Hammond announced the Regular Army Basing Plan. This sets out the future permanent laydown of the army as it moves back to the UK from Germany and restructures to deliver its future operating model, via the Army 2020 programme.

The Army Basing Plan has transitioned into a delivery Programme and this will affect most areas of the Army as more than 100 units will either relocate, re-role, convert or disband over the next six years. This is a massive undertaking and the Army Basing Team and Headquarters Support Command have the Army lead for implementation of the plan, working jointly with the Defence Infrastructure Organisation within the Army Basing Programme.

On 14 November 2014 our local 143 (WM) Brigade will close and merge with 11th Signal Brigade to form the **11th Signal and West Midlands Brigade**. Our Covenant contacts within the Community Engagement Team will be transferring to the new Brigade so their service will remain unaltered with just a change of title.

For a large number of years now Neil and Meg Spalding from Astwood Bank have opened their garden and house to visitors and arranged for refreshments to be provided, many of the cakes being cooked by Meg herself. They also arrange the sale of a number of different items.

On average this wonderful couple raise some £800 every year to be used to help give lifelong support for our Forces and their families.

## SHOULDER TO SHOULDER FAMILIES PROJECT



Families of ex-Servicemen and women face unique challenges in understanding and dealing with the issues their partners, sons and daughters are going through. They may also have been located in a variety of towns and countries and find it hard to settle into a new community.

The Shoulder to Shoulder Families project supports families across the West Midlands by recruiting and training volunteers to act as mentors to help tackle their isolation and signpost them to services that can help. It's run by the national volunteering charity TimeBank, which has extensive experience of volunteer mentoring.

Through their work supporting veterans on TimeBank's Shoulder to Shoulder Project they've learnt a lot about the frustrations families face in adjusting to civilian life, such as registering for a GP when you have no NHS number, having to choose your clothes after years of being told what to wear, the problems children experience when they have no friends in a new place and how hard it is to go from being called 'Sir' to Mr.

Most military leavers' packs don't provide information for the wider family - they are very much focussed on the Service leaver. That's understandable - but the family can also be leaving their home and all they know, with little support.

TimeBank's Shoulder to Shoulder Families project in the West Midlands recruits and trains volunteers to act as mentors to support ex-Service families. Through one-to-one and group mentoring it aims to provide:

- support, advice and guidance to family members of ex-Service personnel and reservists
- help them integrate into community life, build supportive social networks and give them improved chances and choices
- tackle loneliness by building closer links with the local community
- enable family members to increase their self-esteem, social skills and overall mental well-being.

Shoulder to Shoulder believes this will help to strengthen the family unit and benefit the wider family including parents, grandparents and children.

Rewards for Forces are calling out to businesses large and small to get involved in offering discounts to the Armed Forces. Their website is free to join and all members can access the online discounts where codes can be entered at the checkout to redeem savings. This means that Veterans, who have no ID upon leaving the Forces can present their Rewards for Forces card and redeem the offer on the high street.
